(ONLINE COURSE FOR 9 SUNDAY MORNINGS, WITH HOME STUDY,
ASSIGNMENTS, PROJECTS & GROUP CASE STUDIES)

This course is intended for healthcare professionals, religious individuals, laypersons, social workers, psychologists, counselors, and other healthcare providers, as well as caregivers of patients and all those who are dedicated to serving humanity and contributing to a more ethical and humane society. The course has been highly successful since its inception in 2004, and it continues to excel as of 2023. Students have acquired vast knowledge in ethics through this program.

The center is recognized by SIRO (Scientific and Industrial Research Organization, New Delhi) as a research institution. Students are encouraged to pursue research projects to foster critical thinking and problem-solving skills, both professionally and individually.

The course content is designed to empower students by transferring knowledge and skills, enabling them to study, think, discuss, and learn about the ethical and human rights issues that arise in healthcare provision. It will help students develop a concept of human dignity under various biomedical and ethical circumstances. The approach to achieving this goal involves encouraging active participation and interaction, including group brainstorming, inperson and online discussions, as well as independent study sessions for assignments and individual or group projects. Group presentations and case study discussions will also be included.

The objective is to help participants gain an understanding of the ethical, moral, religious, and cultural issues that arise in the context of healthcare provision and biomedical interactions, particularly in relation to human behavior in society, spanning from the «Beginning of Life» to the «End of Life.» Throughout this process, participants will learn to evaluate the nature and consequences of available options in the context of crises and major life events experienced by both caregivers, patients, and healthcare providers. This evaluation will consider the limited and available resources that influence the decisions made in such situations.

We aim to achieve these goals with the assistance of experienced and expert faculty members, both national and international, who are drawn from their respective fields of specialization. We also expect participants to draw on their own experiences and knowledge to work towards their own objectives.

The course will consist of 9 modules, with 4 topics in each module. It will typically be conducted on the 3rd Sunday of each month, from morning to noon, spanning 9 months, starting from July 2024 and concluding in March 2025. The course will be conducted online and will include both individual and group assignments, projects to be presented, and one individual project to be submitted at the end of the course for evaluation and certification.

INTRODUCTION TO THE FUNDAMENTALS AND FOUNDATION PILLARS

INTRODUCTION TO HEALTHCARE ETHICS | DR. NICHOLAS ANTAO

The objective would be to gain sufficient knowledge of basic concepts of Bio-Ethics and ethical as well as moral principles. This is important because the increasing interaction of the People with the Healthcare Services, and the occurrence of more contact flash points of conflicts and differences in viewpoints about the who, why, when, what and how are becoming apparent.

BASIC CONCEPTS AND FUNDAMENTAL PRINCIPLES OF HEALTHCARE ETHICS

| REV. FR. STEPHEN FERNANDES

Objectives would be to learn the Basic tenets underpinning the Concept of Ethics and the fundamentals of the ethical & moral application of Healthcare Sciences and medical procedures. The fundamental pillars of ethical conduct will be stressed. This would include discussions and evaluation of the professional behaviours of medical, pharmaceutical, and genetic scientists and others' roles, in the way they render their services towards humanity.

CURRENT ISSUES AND CONUNDRUMS IN THE APPLICATION OF THE PRINCIPLES OF HEALTHCARE ETHICS | PROF. RUI NUNES

The objective is to stimulate discussions and thinking with a critical and ethical perspective into the current thoughts and viewpoints of prominent scientists and authors in the biomedical field and the practical application of these in our lives. The rapid advances in the field of biomedical and genomic research have led to major changes in the Health Care services and their delivery, creating major conundrums in terms of ethics and morals.

CLINICAL RESEARCH AND THE ETHICAL OVERSIGHT SYSTEMS THAT GOVERN HUMAN RESEARCH | PROF. DR. ANU KANT MITAL

This would give a historical perspective from the inhuman studies such as the Tuskegee study(USA) to the Nazi atrocities in the name of human research, and also the recent research in children and pregnant women. It would then go on to study the oversight committees and legal procedures laid down internationally and nationally like the Helsinki Declaration and the ICMR Guideline as well as the DCGI Register of Registration of Research, and the strict procedures for Institutional Research.

ETHICAL CONCERNS IN THE BEGINNING OF LIFE ISSUES

ETHICS OF REPRODUCTIVE HEALTH AND NATURAL CONCEPTION, TESTTUBE BABIES, IVF, ASSISTED CONCEPTION ETC. | SR. DR. BEENA

Starting from becoming aware of the process of the natural creation of life, with the knowledge of the normal anatomical, physiological and psychological process this module would go on to explore the ethical & moral aspects of the creation of life, it would then help gain perspectives on mankind's propensity to interfere and intervene, evaluating the different ways of the assisted conceptions and ethical dilemmas subsumed within.

ISSUES RELATED TO THE CONCEPT OF ABORTION IN RELATION TO THE PRE-SELECTION OF THE EMBRYO AND PRE DETERMINATION OF THE GENDER. | FR. MATTHEW COUTINHO SDB

Starting with normal sexual behaviour to the concepts of contraception, the session would help gain a perspective related to the other factors, sex of the embryo as well as sex determination tests followed by abortions. It is our aim to sensitize and create awareness about the changing sex ratios in the world and how they affect the social fabric of a community and in the end the country at large.

ETHICAL ISSUES IN THE CONCEPTS OF SURROGACY AND WOMB TRANSPLANTS | DR. SUSAN SODDER

In this session, we intend that the ideas of conception with birth the maternal bonding and the fetus being part of self-feeling would be evaluated. The ethical and moral points of view in the context of Surrogate mothers and Womb transplants will be discussed & evaluated.

ISSUES RELATED TO FOSTER PARENTING AND ADOPTIONS | DR. ROUEN MASCARENHAS

Here the rights of every child, adolescent sibling biological parent adoptive parent and foster family as well as the ethical issues about adoptions by single parents, and same-sex families would be considered. The relevant laws and practices concerning adoptions in our society and culture will also be discussed.

FAMILY & MARITAL ISSUES

CURRENT ISSUES IN THE CONCEPTS OF MARRIAGE AND PARTNERSHIP OF COUPLES

| DR. WILONA ANNUNCIATION

The focus would be on the shift in the role of the Institution of marriage, the cultural rituals and the concept of the roles of the family members. It would help develop a perspective of ethical and moral consequences of cohabitation, live-in partners as well as same-sex couples and the practices of pre-marital and extra-marital sex. The moral and cultural impact of these changes prevalent in the current society will be discussed.

MIXED MARRIAGES AND DISPARITY OF CULT UNIONS | DR. FR. K T EMMANUEL

This session will be focused on the importance of the disparity in social rituals, and cultural and religious matters arising out of marriage between people of different faiths, and cultures and within the religion of different sects. In addition to learning about the need for pre-marriage counselling the ethical part of the sanctity and the marriages being a sacrament would be discussed. The participants would be encouraged to discuss and evaluate the effects.

ETHICAL ISSUES IN FIRST RESPONSE - SEXUAL HARASSMENT AND ABUSE - THE POCSO ACT | DR. NAYREEN DARUWALA

There are numerous horror accounts of how victims have been treated by the supposedly first-contact care providers, especially in the first responders to whom the disclosures are made and recorded. The victims often report feeling reliving of the trauma and further distress when interrogated repeatedly. We will discuss the rules and guidelines provided in the new POCSO Act for the ethical and humane approach to them by the first responders, so as not to traumatize them.

ETHICAL ISSUES IN FAMILY THERAPY AND MARITAL COUNSELLING

| REV. FR. CAJETAN MENEZES

As the times are changing so is the sanctity of the institution of marriage and here the discussion will focus on the ethical issues in the handling of problems in the marriage by counsellors, therapists and the religious. and culture will also be discussed.

ETHICAL ISSUES IN HUMAN ORGAN DONATION AND TRANSPLANTATION

ETHICAL ISSUES IN LIVE AND CADAVERIC ORGAN DONATIONS | DR. SANJAY NAGRAL

The ethical issues in the process of live organs as well as cadaveric donations would be considered in detail including the hidden peer, family, cultural and religious influences on the donors, as well as the morality of unrelated live donations for profit and the consequences. There would be an awareness and sensitization of the need to donate organs after death and also of the ethical & equitable distribution of the same to those waiting. The donation of organs after a loved one does raise many moral and religious concerns.

LEGAL ISSUES IN LIVE AND CADAVERIC ORGAN DONATIONS | MS. SUJATA ASHTEKAR

The participants would learn about the specific laws and procedures, governing the transplant of vital organs, as well as strict protocols laid down, to be followed in the permission and distribution of both Live and Cadaveric organ donations. They would also discuss the role of the watchdog oversight committees which help maintain an ethical and just distribution of organs for transplant. There are different laws governing different organs due to the specific nature of each organ.

ETHICAL CONCERNS IN STEM CELL THERAPY, CLONING, EMBRYONIC RESEARCH & CRYO STORAGE | DR. PASCOAL CARVALHO

The objectives here would be to sensitize and discuss the recent advances in medical sciences which have major moral and ethical issues, especially in stem cell transplants as well as cloning and organoid therapies which attempt to artificially replicate creation. There also would be a discussion on the issues of the use of discarded embryos for preparing medicines vaccines and research.

ETHICAL ISSUES IN BLOOD DONATION AND BONE MARROW DONATIONS | MS. MANISHA KAMAT

The ethical perspective of giving of oneself for the good of others and ethical, medical and other issues arising out of donating blood or bone marrow will be clarified and evaluated here.

ETHICAL ISSUES IN HANDLING MENTAL HEALTH ISSUES AND OTHER BEHAVIORS

ETHICAL ISSUES AND MANAGEMENT OF PSYCHOACTIVE DRUG ABUSE AND USE IN MEDICINES | DR. SHERYL JOHN SENTHILNATHAN

Substance addictions are not only by choice but often a disorder and need intervention and treatment. But then is it ethical to intervene in a choice that a person makes? The participants would learn the ethical and other concerns in the management and rehabilitation of such people.

ETHICAL HANDLING OF BEHAVIORAL & PROCESS ADDICTIONS AND RESPONSIBLE NETISM | MS. SONALI PATANKAR

Often certain behaviors become ingrained and the person needs to be deprogrammed to move on. These behaviours lead to loads of upheavals in the individual's family life and also the socio-cultural environs. The ethical issues will be discussed here mainly from the perspective of whether and when to intervene or not at all.

ETHICAL DILEMMAS IN MANAGING AND REHABILITATION IN DEMENTIA | DR. FABIAN ALMEIDA

The ethical issues of managing patients with dementia involve all the stakeholders, the patient, the caregivers, the healthcare providers as well and the community. The issues too range from emotional to financial inputs. The discussion we hope would focus on these issues with specific case discussions, and evaluate the issues of dealing with people with Dementia.

ETHICAL CONCERNS OF TREATING THE MENTALLY ILL, WITH & WITHOUT CONSENT | DR. AVINASH DE SOUSA

With the enactment of the new Mental Health Care Act in 2017, legal issues have come to the fore, but there are still various ethical issues in the treatment of the mentally ill, both with and without their consent, which have concerns not only for the patient and their caregivers but also for the community at large.

MODULE 6 [15-12-2024]

ISSUES IN MANAGEMENT OF THE ACUTELY ILL AND ICU PATIENTS

ETHICAL CONCERNS IN ICU/CCU/NICU/PICU MANAGEMENT | DR. CONRAD VAS

The core ethical challenge in critical care involves balancing care quantity, quality, and associated costs. End-of-life decisions, like discontinuing assisted ventilation, pose complex ethical dilemmas. Initiating discussions from admission is vital for raising awareness, analyzing bioethical foundations, and ensuring informed decision-making among stakeholders.

ISSUES RELATING TO CONTINUITY OF CARE, THERAPEUTIC OBSTINACY AND RATIONALIZED INTENSIVE CARE | DR. NADEEM MOTLEKAR

The conflict of the healthcare provider in certain cases is between his sense of duty as a Professional doctor and his sense of values as a human being. This in itself adds to the conflict with the caregivers & patient's preferences, to avail of certain treatments or not. The current COVID-19 Pandemic has given us all a ringside view of these dilemmas that healthcare workers face. This is the issue to be evaluated here in the context of the needs of the patients and their caregivers.

ISSUES CONCERNING THE PRESCRIBING OF MEDICINES, PROCEDURES AND INVESTIGATIONS | DR. EGBERT SALDANHA

This session is intended to cover the intricate balance between the prescriptions, their legibility and the investigations, whether warranted or not and the patient's perceptions about the same. This should help clear the air of doubts that arise due to the insistence of preferred labs and brands of medicines and specific expensive investigations. Also due to the enormous advances in technology, doctors often prescribe expensive and invasive procedures. We will assess the patient's autonomy to consent and to accept the consequences of the same.

ISSUES RELATED TO SEXUAL BEHAVIORS & SEXUALLY TRANSMITTED DISEASES AND HIV/AIDS | DR. GEORGE OOMMEN

The ethical dilemmas in dealing with the prevention, identification, and also disclosure and treatment of sexually transmitted diseases including pre & post-test counselling would be shared and discussed as would be the ethical issues of confidentiality in life-threatening contagious diseases. The main focus would be on the disclosure of major life-changing diseases like HIV to sexual partners.

ETHICAL ISSUES ARISING IN SURGICAL AND CANCER CARE

ETHICAL CONCERNS IN SURGICAL PROCEDURES ABOUT CONSENT

| DR. LALIT KAPOOR

When faced with major decisions about irreversible surgeries or procedures, often the patients and caregivers differ not only amongst themselves but also with the healthcare providers, sometimes to the detriment of the patient's health. We would be discussing the ethicality of the decision-making process and the responsibility for the outcomes.

HEALTHCARE ETHICS IN CANCER CARE

| DR. DALE RODRIGUES

Major surgeries, chemotherapy and radiation therapies are the procedures for which the decisions taken in cancer care are very serious ones and have great ramifications on outcomes and the quality of life of the survivors and caregivers. The ethicality of the decisions and choices, leading to decision-making behaviours will be evaluated and assessed from an ethical & moral viewpoint.

PREVENTATIVE SURGERIES IN CANCER - ETHICAL CONCERNS

| DR. JOSEPH SEQUEIRA

In light of the technological advances in the field of diagnosis and pathology, as well as genetics, it is possible to predict the vulnerability to serious diseases very early, leading to preventative surgeries gaining acceptance. We would like the participants to consider the ethical aspect of not only the predictive testing but also the elective surgeries that follow.

As is clear, this session will discuss the issues regarding the ethical use of these valuable resources from doctors, nurses & trained personnel, to drugs, equipment and vaccines. We would look at the vast disparity of availability, accessibility and affordability and seek ethical views on the same.

The ethical dilemmas in dealing with the prevention, identification, and also disclosure and treatment of sexually transmitted diseases including pre & post-test counselling would be shared and discussed as would be the ethical issues of confidentiality in life-threatening contagious diseases.
